Use the 'Book-Talk' questions in this guide to prompt discussion between you and your child as you share a story, poem or non-fiction text.





The wise owl helps us to make sure we know the meanings of words.

Draw on knowledge of vocabulary to understand texts.

The lion helps us hunt for important information in the text.

Identify and explain key aspects of fiction and non-fiction texts, such as characters, events, titles and information.

The elephant who never forgets, helps us to remember the sequence of events.

Identify and explain the sequence of events in texts.

The sly fox helps us to infer from the text.

Make inferences from the text. (The fox needs to be really clever because the answer is not always in the text.)

The hawk's eyes see into the distance and help us to predict what might happen.

Predict what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far.

- What do you think this story is going to be about? What makes you think that?
- Where do you think this poem/story is set? What makes you think that?
- What is happening now? What do you think might have happened before?
- Based on what you have read, what does the last paragraph suggest might happen next?
- What has happened? What is happening now? What do you think might happen next?
